RACHMANINOFF RECITAL A Crowded Academy of Music Hears a Delightful Plano Concert

Rechmaninoff played at the Academy of Music yesterday afternoon before the largest audience which has greeted him in recital in this city. There was not a yucant seat, the programme was interesting and the audience enthusiastic. There were five numbers on the pro-

graume, including eleven separate compositions, in addition to which the artist gave a number of encores. The programme included Liszi's Ballade No. 2. Grieg's Ballade, opns 24. The Chopin numbers included the Ballade No. 3. a Nocturne Valse opus 27, in D flat major, and a Scherzo opus 23, alf familiar

and a Scherzo opus 39, all familiar through having been played by every planist of distinction in the last three generations. The artists interpretations were his own, differing somewhat from those given by some of his predecessors.

programme and was listened to with rapt attention. The artist never appeared to better advantage and was gracious enough to give a number of encores and the audience would have

detained him much longer had he been willing to oblige. The musical element in Philadelphia was out in full force.
