

**WOODSTOCK**

Henry A. Bosworth, a leading farmer and respected citizen of Eastford, died last Wednesday at the Day Kimball hospital, Putnam, from the after effects of an operation for intestinal trouble. He was a descendant of one of New England's old and honorable families. His father was Samuel Davis Bosworth, and his mother Elizabeth (Badger) Burt. He was born Nov. 4, 1841, in the house that is now used at the Congregational church parsonage in Eastford. His education was obtained in the district schools and Woodstock academy, after which he assisted his father in operating the home farm and later took over the whole control. On April 14, 1874, Mr. Bosworth was united in marriage with Miss Margaret Buel, a native of East Boston, Mass., who proved to be an exemplary wife and mother. Her death occurred some years ago, and Mr. Bosworth took for his second wife Miss Alice Car-

poster, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Carpenter of Eastford, who survives him. Mr. Bosworth also leaves 12 children. They are Miss Carrie Bosworth of Southbridge, Mrs. George Bowen, Bealston, Mrs. William Warren, Mrs. Charles Talbot, all of Eastford; George Bosworth of Woodstock, Edgar, Edwin, Harrison, Burton, Wendell and Marguerite, the last two also residing in Woodstock. The funeral, which was private, was held Sunday, and burial was in the family lot.

**ELLIS CONCERTS START NOV. 4**

Lovers of music in Webster-Dudley and vicinity who enjoy the best possible offerings, will be equally interested in the Worcester Ellis course this coming season. These concerts, commencing in Mechanics hall, Worcester, Nov. 4, will be notable for the quality and pre-eminence of the artists who will appear.

Four concerts are to be given, for which subscription tickets will be sold. The dates are Nov. 4, Nov. 11, Nov. 18 and Jan. 20.

Geraldine Farrar, for 10 years leading prima donna of the world's greatest opera, and recently engaged for three years more at the Metropolitan Opera House, is the central figure of the opening concert. Miss Farrar, whose many aided activities have made her famous the world over, is best known as an opera singer, but as an interpreter of songs she is no less successful than in opera. She has not been heard in Worcester for four years. Assisting Miss Farrar in this concert will be Rosita Renard, the young Chilean pianist, who played in Worcester so admirably with the Boston Symphony orchestra last winter. Miss Renard is a native of Santiago, where she won a scholarship entitling to five years' study in Europe at the expense of the Chilean government. That these years of study bore rich fruit is evident by Miss Renard's brilliant performance. Arthur Hackett, the American tenor with a remarkable voice, will also take part.

Fritz Kreisler, the world's foremost violin virtuoso, and composer of music for his instrument that is admired and played by all his contemporaries, will be the second attraction on Nov. 11.

The third concert, on Dec. 16, will be devoted to a program of music for the pianoforte by Rachmaninoff, the Russian virtuoso, composer and conductor. Forced by the revolution to leave his country last year, after the loss of all his property, he made his way with difficulty to America, where his success has probably been equalled by no other pianist, save Paderewski.

The Boston Symphony orchestra, numbering 100 members, Pierre Monteaux, conductor, will give the closing concert on Jan. 20. This orchestra, organized and maintained for 19 years solely for concert performance, is the model by which all similar organizations are judged. The subscription books are now open.
